A Message from Your Pastor

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent, a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. Ash Wednesday emphasizes our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. Both themes help us realize that both have

been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The imposition of ashes marks the beginning of Lent. In many churches the ashes are made by burning the palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday.

As the ashes are placed on the forehead, words such as these are spoken:

"Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return," recalling God's words to Adam in Genesis 3:19, or "Repent, and believe the gospel" recalling the message of both John the Baptist and Jesus (Mark 1:15).

Through the service of ashes on Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, we

come before God recognizing our humanity, repenting of our sin, and remembering who we are and who we can be. I pray that we will all observe a Holy Lent spending time in prayer and drawing closer to God and one another.

Women's Retreat 2026


“Dare to Imagine”

March 6-7, 2026





A View from the Pew

MEET SHARON TOROSKY

Sharon Torosky and her family have been active members of Ebenezer UMC since she was a young wife and mother in the early 1980's. Sharon met her husband Tony Torosky on a blind date in 1962 when he was in the Navy, and they married in 1964, later becoming the parents of Michael and Cyndi. Tony worked for Goddard Space Center for a while, then Bell Atlantic for 33 years in telecommunications. Sharon was an X-ray technician, working at various hospitals over 35 years. During that time, she was also a hospice volunteer. "I loved it, it was very rewarding, helping people," she said.

Shortly after Sharon retired in 2008, the couple became grandparents to Jamie and Michael's son AJ, followed by Aaron and Autumn. "The grandkids are the love of my life and bring me so much joy," Sharon said. She takes the three to Sunday school, where the two younger are in confirmation class this year. Daughter Cyndi, a dermatologist who lives in Virginia Beach with husband Frank, has a daughter Marilyn Grace, and two stepsons, Dorian and Julian.

Sharon has a unique story to tell about her home in Winfield. "Tony built our house over two years from 1975 to 1977 during the day while working full time at night," she recalled. "We had been to Spain and fell in love with the architecture, and Tony had studied architectural drawing. So, he drew up the plans and built the house himself. We lived with my grandfather in Linthicum, and he helped Tony build the house." The two-story white stucco Spanish style house is a one-of-a-kind on their street.

During their younger years, the couple enjoyed traveling, visiting London, Italy, Spain, Portugal and Germany. In the USA, they went camping to national parks, the Grand Canyon, the South and New England, and visited Hawaii and Panama Canal. "Traveling the world was our stage," she said. She and Tony cruised to Alaska for their 50th anniversary. They especially loved skiing, often with her nieces and nephews and dear friends, even taking Pastor Rick Gray, Matt and Bradley with them one year, where "we had such a good time," she said.

After settling into their new home, Sharon and Tony started looking for a church. "We needed a place for our kids to go to Sunday school," Sharon said. "Rev. Glenn Hickman was pastor when we first came here."

Later, Rev. Rick arrived and "was there in the kids' formative years – for confirmation, youth group, camping, Manidokan. I owe a lot of my growth and my kids' growth to Pastor Rick." A woman of deep faith,

Sharon has been involved in Bible studies, adult Sunday School, the Stephen Ministry program, OWLS and WOWS. She also helps with Holly Mart, making crafts and cheeseballs, and working in the kitchen in various capacities. She was one of the founders of the Women of the Word (WOW) group at a time when "we were all young moms, so much was going on and there was a need. For 35 years we shared our laughter, tears, support, love and prayers. Our Women's Retreat began with our 'humble little group' and still continues," she said.

Tony also was involved in the church as a trustee and cemetery committee member. For those who may not know the story, prior to the mid-1980s, church members used to enter the sanctuary through the narthex door and cross over the altar to be seated. (What is now the back of the church). "It was very disruptive," Sharon said. "You had people coming in late, taking their children to the bathroom, and such, and they had to go past the pastor." To get the congregation to agree to a complete reversal of the sanctuary to where it is now, Tony built a replica of what it would look like. "They did it in one week," Sharon said. "As soon as the last service ended one Sunday, a group of parishioners, friends and workers came in and ripped everything out, rebuilding the altar, replacing the carpet and installing electric for the organ and cross. Everybody pitched in, with the women polishing the pews so they looked like new, and we re-opened the next Sunday. Tony made it happen, so it's kind of his legacy."

But in 2016, Sharon's life was turned upside down when Tony and her mother died within 30 days of each other. "It was only by my faith, my WOW sisters, my family and friends and my church family that

I navigated through my loss and grief"; she said. Besides being close to her family, Sharon enjoys gardening and yard work, reading mysteries, watching Hallmark Christmas and other movies, playing cards with friends, and attending the OWLS and church widows monthly meetings, along with her other church activities.



Children's Church

Children's Church meets on the second and fourth Sunday of every month from 11 AM to 12 PM. All children ages 4-17 are welcome to join us with the older ones helping as leaders!

Our goal this year is to encourage children to actively participate in serving the Lord. In November, we made trail mix for the Hoffa House. In January, we prepared blessing bags for the Cold Weather Shelter, and in February, we will make cards for church members who are homebound. In March, we will reenact Palm Sunday.

2026 Pill Bottle Recycling

Matthew 25 Ministries assisted over 30 million people in 2025 and EUMC was a part of that! They sent building, school, cleaning and medical supplies to places in need in the United States and 70 countries worldwide. This includes many states like Arizona, California, Florida, and Missouri. Kentucky received 128 barrels of supplies during its disaster recovery! The countries include

Honduras, Israel, Ukraine, and Panama. The first box of 250 pill bottle donations has been mailed to Matthew 25 ministries for worldwide use. This

shipment brings the total number of pill bottles recycled by EUMC to just over 8,000! We continue to reduce the need for single use plastics and save space in our landfills while supporting medical need. Please continue to bring your CLEAN bottles to recycle! Donations for shipping are welcome as well.

WREATHS —across— AMERICA

Thoughts shared by Sandy Newsome Wreaths Across America 2025 Ebenezer United Methodist Church Cemetery

We gather in this sacred place of honor and memory as part of Wreaths Across America—a national tradition since 1992 that reminds us of a deeply important truth: we are free because of the courage, sacrifice, and service of those who came before us. Now, this is a really cold day, but I promise you 2 things. First, it is worth it. Your presence here matters ... it matters to the families honoring their loved ones, to the memory of the past and to the passing on the

lesson of gratitude to future generations. To paraphrase Romans 13, verse 7 "Give everyone what is due him ...if respect, then respect; if honor, then honor." And secondly, speaking from personal experience, I promise you it is NOT as cold here as launching aircraft from the flightline of Chong Ju, Korea at 4:30 in the morning in February.

Each December, volunteers across the country come together on this day to lay wreaths on the headstones of our veterans. This is more than decoration. It is a promise—one made by every generation to the next—that the names and the sacrifices of our warriors will never be forgotten. We are here today in gratitude and reverence - that deep respect we owe to the sacrifice of so many.

Today we've laid our symbolic wreaths for all of the services and our soldiers, sailors, marines, and airmen who will never have a stone or a wreath. Those whose human remains may be lost to us forever. But the work of bringing them home does continue. So far in 2025, 231 sets of remains have at last been identified, with 165 of those from World War 2. Here at Ebenezer, 5 – yes, 5 new graves were discovered this year with the four unknown, but marked confederate graves. Five soldiers, whose families never knew the resting place of their child. At last, today, for the first time, their service is recognized. I also want to acknowledge that Ebenezer lost one of its own veterans this fall with the sudden passing of Jim Carlock. Jim will soon take his well-deserved place with the heroes at Arlington National Cemetery.

We observe three principles by being here today: The first principle is Remembrance. We remember the men and women who served—those who stood guard in times of war and peace, those who flew the planes, sailed the seas, and who marched into danger. Their courage lives on in every wreath we place. Veterans made choices—often difficult, dangerous, and life-altering. Remembering their sacrifice means recognizing the courage it takes to stand in harm's way, encounter hardship and sacrifice, and uphold a duty larger than themselves. By remembering that sacrifice and cost today, we learn not to take our freedoms for granted. We acknowledge the loss, the deaths, the injuries – both visible and invisible. Our ceremony today helps our understanding of responsibility, service, and unity—values that help bind a community and a nation together. Remembering inspires future generations to live by the values of duty, honor, and commitment. It reminds us, too, that freedom and peace require real effort.

The Second Principle is Honor. We honor the veteran for their life and service and we honor the families who bore the weight of sacrifice—the parents, spouses, children, and the friends who supported their loved ones and endured hardship with them; endured their absence and sometimes their ultimate sacrifice. Every veteran who has gone on before us—whether in combat, in service, or after a time as a civilian—represents a life offered in service, time spent away from family, hardships endured for the sake of others, and a willingness to step into danger so others wouldn't have to. Many of you pass this cemetery on your daily commute or as you arrive at church. May you pause and reflect on what those interred here gave for you. We honor those resting here, and at Arlington, and at Gettysburg, and other sacred sites, by living in a way that respects their service and sacrifice. We honor them when we live as responsible citizens, when we understand the price of our freedom and use that freedom wisely, when we care for each other, and when we serve – even when we serve in our own communities. The third principle observed today is Teaching. Today, we teach. We teach our children what service means. We teach them that freedom is NOT free and cannot be taken for granted. We teach them to recognize the dignity of the veterans among us every day and to carry forward the responsibility and lessons of remembrance.

So, as we lay these wreaths, do it with deliberate intention and honor. Say the veteran's name. Remember that behind each stone is a life, a family, and a legacy. Let this simple gesture—a wreath placed on a grave—speak of remembrance, of honor and of gratitude. To our veterans here with me today: brothers and sisters, I'm glad you made it home. Thank you for your service. To those we have lost: we honor your memory. And to all who came today to remember: thank you for keeping the promise never to forget. May we leave here inspired—reminded of our duty to preserve the freedom so many fought to protect, and committed to carrying their legacies and lessons into the future.


