A View from the Pew

MEET MIKE NICKEY

Mike Nickey has been a member of Ebenezer since 1994 after he and then- wife Vicki moved from Glen Burnie to Westminster in October 1993 seeking better schools for their young children, Samantha and Max. "My ex-wife was looking for a church and one Sunday came home and said she'd found a church," Mike recalled. "So we went and liked it here and stayed." The couple later divorced in 1999.

Being a musician who played guitar, banjo, and mandolin, he got with then- pastor Gayle Annis-Forder and started a youth singing group for middle and high school students in 1998-99. "We did some really challenging music," Mike said. "We had some really good singers, too - Stephanie Carlock, Heidi and Julie Davis, Tom and Julie Sager." During the five or so years the group was together, they would participate in an annual concert with youth from several other area churches to raise money, and perform a play for the church Christmas Dinner.

Mike also helped with the recreation part of VBS and at Camp Manidokan. He would play his guitar in church occasionally and at the Ebenezer Palooza events. Mike said though he could sing, he never joined the church choir.. An engineer, Mike worked for a company that manufactured semi-conductors. He developed different processes and kept the production line going among other functions.

In 2017 Mike started having health problems. "I was stiff in my legs, I hurt all the time, I'd freeze where I couldn't move my legs," he said. The diagnosis turned out to be Parkinson's Disease (PD), a neurological disorder that affects its victims in different ways and has no known cure. He was put on the usual PD medication, carbidopa-levodopa, but later he started getting tardive dyskinesia (TD), where the body moves erractically and uncontrollably. He then underwent surgery to implant two electrodes in the top of his brain to control the TD. "The electrodes are deep brain stimulation that fire short pulses of electrical energy very rapidly," Mike said. "It helps take the place of the medications. I used to take twice the meds I'm taking now." He currently takes a slow-release form of carbidopalevodopa called Rytary to control the disease, and the electrodes have helped considerably in reducing TD movement. Despite having Parkinson's, Mike's company was supportive of his needs and he was able to keep working until this last December, when he retired at age 72. "The company was flexible about my hours," he said. "They were very good about that."

Samantha, who is single and is a web editor at Carroll Community College, lives with her dad. Mike just finished putting on an addition to his house to have a first-floor bedroom and bathroom so he won't have to go up and down stairs so much. Samantha lives in the rest of the house, where she also has an art studio. Now that the addition is finished, Mike said they're looking forward to getting two kittens from a friend whose cat had a litter, since they've had cats through the years.

His son, Max, a captain for the county's new career paramedic program, is only a short distance away. His wife, Kellie, is an X-ray technician for LifeBridge. The couple have two children, Jaxon, 10, and Ava, 7.

Before the PD, Mike used to play basketball and enjoyed making and fixing things, as well as making music. Now, with time on his hands since retirement, Mike "reads a lot and plays with the grandkids," he said. But he is still able to drive, take care of himself, do his shopping, and of course, come to church, where he recently joined Pastor Rick's Bible study class on Tuesdays.

Our pantry has been serving 75-86 families in the last several months. We are giving out quite a bit of food, so we have been looking into other sources to keep our pantry stocked.

A few weeks ago, a tractor trailer filled with food from the Morman Church in Utah arrived here in Woodbine.. Jim Wise, Rick Byrd and Sue Bergmann were there to have their vehicles loaded full of food. What a blessing! Rick and Sue have also picked up food from the Rescue Mission in Westminster. We partnered with them last year and are very thankful. Sue will also be picking up food from Winfield Elementary in 2 weeks which they will collect from the students in conjunction with their Play Day. We will have a booth set up at the Winfield Carnival (July 7-12) this summer to collect food as people come onto the carnival grounds. We are looking for help manning the booth each evening from 6:00-9:00 PM since many of our pantry volunteers are already committed to helping at the Lions Club booth. There will be a sign up sheet on the bulletin board in the Narthex.

This would be a great opportunity for our high school youth! We appreciate all the support of our pantry, whether through clothing and household donations to our shed or food and non food donations. The families we serve are so thankful!

We have changed the name of the "shed" to "Compassion Closet". The donations we receive of clothing and household items have really been a blessing. The neighbors that come on food pantry Saturday have shared with us how grateful they are to be able to find clothing for all ages. We recently were able to help someone who was finding clothes for a family who lost everything in a house fire. She had a list of ages and sizes and our volunteers went to work to help find something for everyone. We were able to provide linens and some household items as well. Our new addition of having Bibles available has opened up some wonderful conversations. We were even able to send winter coats to the homeless in D.C, with a church member who has a connection. Our space is limited but we do appreciate the donations of seasonally appropriate clothing. It is also helpful if you contact us with donations before the third Saturday Food Pantry day so we have time to organize everything.

The Bible study class, missing a few, went for lunch after the study ended for the season.


Pastor Rick will be leading an adult study during VBS and the Tuesday morning study will resume in the fall.


